Key facts and figures

2020-2021

- Periodicals budget: £5.23m
- Transformative Agreements (TAs) ONLY funded from Periodicals budget
- Pool of REF research outputs: ~30,750
- Numbers of REF eligible researcher staff: ~1804





What is a Transformative Agreement (TA)?

UoN Libraries summary

- Transformative agreements, also referred to as transitional or "read and publish" agreements, are contracts negotiated between institutions and publishers that transform the business model underlying scholarly publishing towards a fully open access model.
- They represent a further shift away from a subscription-only model to one which covers both subscription payments (the "read" element of the agreement) and Article Processing Charges (the "publish" element).
- In the UK, negotiations with publishers are led by <u>Jisc Collections</u>, acting on behalf of higher education institutions.

February 2020: Read & Publish Group proposal

Scoping statement

- Monthly meeting to discuss the read and publish options, with standing members
- Disseminating information around R&P deals
- Establishing VFM indicators
- Co-ordinating responses and questions for publishers
- Final decision making

"(there's a) strand around **managing funding**, but I think it's a **higher-level strategic conversation outside of the deals.**" "We've had several smaller read and publish deals announced recently, alongside reviewing the larger deals. I'm finding it **challenging to review and share feedback in a timely manner**, mainly due to either the complexity of the deal or short timescales for feedback (or both)."

"I don't think members need to attend every meeting, but there might be something which is relevant around a particular deal which needs to be shared or reviewed... help us to prepare and coordinate responses, and **if there's no deals we can skip the meeting for that month.**"

- Meet funder requirements: rights retention etc.?

Is it a true TA, or is a "good enough" agreement acceptable?

Read


- Total cost R&P, VAT, Year on Year

Publish

- Publishing levels for UoN Authors
- Author requirements
- APC numbers / allowances / charges / caps


- Review criteria Matrix costs, APC details, authors, open access...

- Invoicing / Payments
- Author guidance and comms

Reject

- Read Only
- Publish and Read
- No agreement

Ongoing

- Documentation
- Awareness
- Managing new / existing agreements
- Renewals cycle
- Trouble shooting TA



2022 - Challenges


